#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Trustees, for the purpose of charity law, are the Directors of the charitable company. Throughout this report the Trustees are collectively referred to as the Directors.

#### **GOVERNING DOCUMENT**

Volunteer Tutors Organisation ("the charity") is a company limited by guarantee (No SC249724) and a recognised Scottish Charity (No SC000403) governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

#### APPOINTMENT OF DIRECTORS

New Directors are appointed at the discretion of the Board. There is no fixed term for directorship. New Directors take part in an induction programme which aims to familiarise them with the charity's values, aims and objectives together with its day-to—day operations, in addition to clarifying their statutory responsibilities as Directors of the company limited by guarantee and Trustees of a charity.

#### ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The Directors are responsible for the overall direction of the charity. They serve on a voluntary basis and meet monthly as a body and additionally in sub-groups as necessary.

The charity is governed by a Board of Directors, the trustees, who work in conjunction with six specially focused sub-groups that include both Board members and employees. The areas covered by the sub-groups are:

- HR.
- Finance and Funding.
- IT.
- Marketing.
- Training and Compliance.
- Strategy.

Each sub-group meets as required and reports directly to the Board of Trustees. The whole organisation is overseen by the Chairman. Our Head of Service, Barbara Oliver, together with the Operations Manager, oversees a staff compliment of 21. This includes an Administrator, 12 Learning Community Coordinators (LCCs), 3 senior LCCs and 3 specialist support roles.

The past 12 months have been spent adjusting to being fully reintegrated into in-person working whilst still delivering a high level of online support. This process led to a shift in employment strategy to provide better opportunities for our staff, encouraging improved staff retention and to support our growth in different geographical areas. Our aim is to provide more stability for our service, for the staff and volunteers who allow our service to run and most importantly for the young people who benefit from our service.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The charity recruits, trains and manages a bank of volunteer tutors to provide educational support to disadvantaged children who have recognised learning needs mainly in literacy and numeracy. Referrals can be submitted by anyone (often teachers, social workers, or parents/carers). Our Learning Communities Coordinators process the referrals in collaboration with the schools and guardians, to assess the child's needs.

Historically our main activity was to provide one-to—one tuition, primarily in the children's homes or in other venues such as libraries or community centres where home environments are not suitable, and this is still a central service in the organisation. However, in recent years we have diversified into providing Learning Hub support groups. These had to be suspended due to Covid restrictions but were actively reinstated in the previous financial year and have continued as a central activity in the current year.

Leaming Hubs are established in response to schools who flag up that this sort of provision would be desirable clue to a significant number of children being identified who would benefit from this support. We have groups dedicated to help children living in Kinship Care and groups aimed at children who are in families recovering from drug and alcohol addiction. We also have Hubs that operate in areas with high levels of immigrant children whose first language is not English, and other groups that are situated in areas of high deprivation. We also have extensive experience of working with Care Experienced young people and this area continues to grow and have a significant impact on our funding streams.

Where our Learning Hubs are not specifically for children living in Kinship Care or otherwise Care Experienced, they are available for any child affected by the poverty—related attainment gap. As well as providing tutoring to children with recognised learning needs within the Hubs, we also recruit and train senior pupils from local secondary schools facilitating them to assist with the tutoring and mentoring of the younger students through our Senior Pupil Leadership Programme.

Alongside our increased provision of face-to-face tutoring and Learning Hubs, our online tutoring offering has continued to thrive this year.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

#### Workforce

Although our in—person services have now fully resumed, the expansion of our staff team led to home working being solidified as a part of our normal working practice. Our staff continue to utilise our working from home provision although the office is occupied most of time. The Head of Service and Administrator are based there, and we continue to utilise online functionality for recruiting and training our volunteers and managing staff remotely, where possible, to improve productivity and reduce costs. Our workforce reduced slightly from 22 to 21 staff in the year. Due to staff attrition of part—time-roles we took the decision to create more full-time roles and to expand job specifications to stabilise the work force and consequently service growth.

#### Volunteers

As a result of the enthusiasm, passion and diverse skill sets of our volunteers we have been able to provide one-to—one tutoring support to more than 450 children and young people this year. Our volunteers are the backbone of our organisation, some of whom go the extra mile by supporting our Learning Hubs as well as our Home Tuition Programme. In the past 12 months we have trained 251 adult tutors to support our young people across our services.

#### Learning Hubs

We successfully expanded our Learning Hub network this year and introduced/reintroduced 13 additional Hubs bringing the total to 21. The VTO supported 232 pupils via this service with the help of 151 Senior Pupils. 17 of our Hubs are based in Primary Schools, 1 in partnership with the North-West Kinship Support Group and 3 in partnership with Glasgow Health and Social Care Partnership. Two of the Primary School Learning Hubs were launched in Edinburgh, a first for VTO. An average of 10 pupils attended each Hub, weekly, supported by Senior Pupils from 11 different Secondary Schools.

There are plans in place to roll out a further 8 hubs, including 2 new Hubs in Edinburgh, in the Autumn of 2023.

#### **QuESTS (Qualifications for Every Student Through Tutor Support)**

This service is aimed at young people who do not attend school or are on a part-time timetable and at risk of leaving school with no qualifications. The QuESTS programme has been successful again this year with 26 pupils receiving support, mainly through our Inspire project in Glasgow. VTO enjoys a strong partnership with the Glasgow Virtual School (Education Services) through the Inspire project. Through this, VTO supports care experienced young people in Glasgow with one-to-one and QuESTS tutor support.

#### **Other Projects**

VTO works with partners across the statutory sector to ensure that VTO support can be given to the young people who need it the most. These projects include Prosper, Thrive, and Inspire where we work with teams within each local authority area to provide educational support to Care Experienced young people.

#### Prosper

We worked in partnership with Perth and Kinross Social Services to support Care Experienced young people through online 1-2-1 tuition. The pilot launched in winter 2020 with positive results and was rolled out in earnest in the previous financial year. We supported a total number of 20 pupils in the current year. There will be a further 40 places available for support through this project in the new academic session.

#### **Thrive**

Thrive is a project working in partnership with the City of Edinburgh Council to support care experienced young people through 1-2-1 tuition. We supported 15 pupils in the current year and there will be 40 places available for this project in the new academic year.

#### Inspire

Our Inspire project has continued to be a success with 60 young people having been supported during this year on both our one-to-one and QuESTS services. Our strong partnership with the Glasgow Virtual School is key to the success of this project.

#### Rising Stars

Rising Stars is an organisation with the role of "Bettering the lives of young people in Scotland, one game at a time" through their basketball coaching programme. Through their 'From the court to the classroom' initiative, they aim to provide further support to young people and have partnered with VTO to provide educational support to some of the young people on their programme. 7 young people have received tutor support through this project partnership. It has been enormously successful and both VTO and Rising Stars look forward to working together again in the coming academic year.

#### Schools

Through all of our services we have developed strong partnerships with the following primary schools, including 2 schools in Edinburgh, which was a new development for VTO: Cuthbertson, Parkview, Highpark, Sandwood, Oakgrove, St Marnocks, Craigroyston (Edinburgh), Pirniehall (Edinburgh), St Brides, Tinto, Darnley, Carntyne, Holycross and Saracen.

Our secondary school partnerships included: Kelvinside Academy, The Glasgow Academy, John Paul Academy, The High School of Glasgow, Hutchesons Grammar School, Rosshall Academy, Hillpark Secondary and Craigroyston Community High School (Edinburgh).

#### **Partnerships**

VTO enjoys a well—established partnership with the Glasgow Virtual School delivering the Inspire project. Through this, VTO supports care experienced young people in Glasgow with one-to-one and QuESTS support.

Our partnership with Perth & Kinross Council delivers the Prosper project in support of care experienced young people. Funding has been agreed with them to appoint our first ever on-the-ground staff member in Perth & Kinross, our Outreach Coordinator, to enhance the impact further by supporting in—person tutoring and to introduce Learning Hubs in this local authority area.

VTO continues to work in collaboration with City of Edinburgh Council with the Thrive project supporting care experienced young people in Edinburgh.

VTO hosted their 2023 Annual General Meeting in the Advanced Research Centre on the University of Glasgow Campus.

The Byres Community Hub at the School of Health & Wellbeing (Clarice Pears) on the University of Glasgow Campus, has been an invaluable partnership this year. Thanks to their support we held our Trustees Development Day in April on the Campus as well as our Staff Development Day in June.

We renewed our partnership with National5.com for the academic year 23-24. Andrew Eadie provided support in offering free access to this wonderful Maths resource for our pupils and their tutors who are working on National 5 Maths this year.

#### **Fundraising**

VTO staff and volunteers donned their walking shoes and kilts once again for the 2023 Kiltwalk in a bid to boost our funds for the year ahead. This effort generated our best ever fundraising total.

#### Marketing

Our marketing strategy is focused on increasing our profile to attract new volunteers and funding to the organisation. In the last 12 months, we launched a marketing campaign to increase VTO's social media presence. As part of our efforts to make VTO more accessible to volunteers, families and funders, we implemented a significant redesign of our website's homepage.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

As per the Statement of Financial Activities on page 9, the charity reported net ingoing resources for the year of £58,565 (2022: outgoing £19,417) and total reserves on 31 May 2023 of £156,029 (2022: £97,464) of which £111,778 related to Restricted Funds (2022: £29,059).

#### Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds (i.e. unrestricted funds not committed or invested in fixed assets) at a level that equates to approximately three months of unrestricted expenditure. On 31 May 2023, the charity's unrestricted funds as per the General Fund on page 10 amounted to £44,251 (2022: £68,405) which was acceptable to the Directors who continue their efforts to attract ongoing funding.

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

In the current year our "Framework for Expansion" which sets out how the organisation can develop throughout Scotland, is well underway. As a result, we have now expanded outside the Glasgow area and have established projects in Edinburgh and Perth & Kinross. In parallel with these innovations the organisation has been a developing staff structure designed to be capable of responding to the requirements of a growing organisation.

Our funding has been steady over the current year and will increase into the next year, giving us a relatively stable place to proceed from. We aim to continue to deliver on our existing projects, whilst always looking out for new opportunities.

#### Year ended 31 May 2023

#### 1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland and a registered charity in Scotland. The address of the registered office is St Charles Primary School, 13 Kelvinside Gardens, Glasgow, G20 6BG.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

#### 3. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis. The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

#### **Taxation**

Volunteer Tutors Organisation Ltd is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities.

#### Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

#### Fund accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

#### Incoming resources

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income: Income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.

#### 3. Accounting policies (continued)

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as the liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examiner's fee and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource.

#### Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:
